HIDE AND SEEK WITH PUPPETS

ENGINEERING: INVESTIGATION

Every child is different. Do what works best for encouraging each child's exploration of this suggested activity.

OBJECTIVE OF THIS INVESTIGATION:

Given an item, children will determine the best hiding spot for the item so that a puppet can't find it.

MATERIALS:

- one item for children to hide (e.g., a pretend orange or other smaller item)
- a puppet or stuffed animal to hide the item from
- large boxes and small boxes
- large and small bowls
- scarves and blankets

Trial and Error Investigator

THIS INVESTIGATION:

- Introduce the puppet and activity to children.
 "Oh no! I have a problem. This puppet wants to eat my orange! Can you use these materials to hide the orange so she doesn't eat it?"
- Provide boxes, sheets, or any other materials children can easily hold and manipulate to hide the item.
- As children attempt to hide the orange (even if not fully), narrate their problem-solving.

"Ohhhh! I see you're using the box to hide the orange. Good idea!"

- Once children have hidden the item, bring Ms. Moose out and have her pretend to look for the orange.
- "Let's see if Ms. Moose can find the orange."
 If children problem-solved hiding the orange, reinforce
- their problem solving: "Wow! Mo Moose age?t find the events growthere

"Wow! Ms. Moose can't find the orange anywhere. You hid it so well. She can't see it!

• If children didn't fully hide the orange, help scaffold fixing the problem.

"Hmm, Ms. Moose sees a little bit of orange peeking out from the box. The orange isn't hidden all the way. Let's try a new spot that's bigger and can cover the whole orange!"

• Children can reveal their hiding spots at the end and play again.

Adaptations for general ideas and strategies

Materials:

- Provide fewer materials to use to hide the item.
- Provide two materials (one that will work and one that won't) for children to test hiding their item with/in.

HOW TO CONTINUE THIS INVESTIGATION:

 Create other similar problems for children to solve. "Let's hide this toy from Mom and see if she can find it. Where can we put it, so she won't see it?"
